On your FAFSA form, you indicated that either you or your spouse are a dislocated worker. In general, a person may be considered a dislocated worker if he or she is: (1) receiving unemployment benefits due to being laid off or losing a job and is unlikely to return to a previous occupation (2) has been laid off or received a lay-off notice from a job (3) was self-employed but is now unemployed due to economic conditions or natural disaster (4) is a displaced homemaker. A displaced homemaker is generally a person who previously provided unpaid services to the family (e.g., a stay-at home mom or dad), is no longer supported by the husband or wife, is unemployed or underemployed, and is having trouble finding or upgrading employment.
